"The Greens are calling for a tripartite approach to support the geo-tourism industry in Braddon, given the globally significant sites literally littered across the north and west coasts of Tasmania," Mr O'Halloran said.

"The recent 19th Australasian Cave and Karst Management Conference has shown international interest in our amazing areas, and we need to utilise this interest and foster an industry which supports its growth."
