Key education revolution criterion disclosed

In an email to a NSW Treasury official, an education department official said many schools that applied for refurbished toilets under the federal government's school building program were rejected because they were not deemed "iconic enough".

Under the guidelines, libraries, multi-purpose halls or classrooms were referred to as iconic facilities. "Toilets or administration blocks do not have a sufficient degree of iconicness," the official said. [SMH](#)
